Learn and Getting to know the territory you live in and the communities you Understand by serve. Develop a land acknowledgement based on relationships.

Explore by Learning about Indigenous economic rights under the Declaration of the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (3, 5, 17, 20, 21, 23, 32, 36).

Recognize by Amplifying the successes of Indigenous Entrepreneurship and

businesses like Animikii or Dreamcatcher Promotions.

Take action by Engaging with Indigenous businesses and suppliers and encouraging

management to engage with business-specific training and certification with Canadian Council for Aboriginal Business.

**Teach by** Sharing allyship materials with colleagues like the Montreal Urban

Aboriginal Community Strategy Network: Indigenous Ally Toolkit.

Learn and Understand: Get to know your Treaty territory (or if you're on unceded land) and the Indigenous communities that you serve and are nearest to you (https://www.whose.land/en/). Develop a new land acknowledgement based on your relationship with Indigenous peoples and communities or the need to develop one.

Explore: Learn about Indigenous economic rights under the Declaration of the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (3, 5, 17, 20, 21, 23, 32, 36).

Recognize: Amplify the successes of Indigenous Entrepreneurship and businesses like Animikii.
